Tackling Poverty

I believe that the Church of England, as the national church, needs to be present for everyone in society with a bias towards the marginalized and those caught up in poverty, and if elected I will continue to speak up on this issue.

The North East has some of the highest rates of child poverty in the country – here in South Tyneside 1 in 3 children are growing up in the poverty trap - something I believe we cannot ignore if we say we follow in the footsteps of Jesus.

I have consistently looked for practical ways in which churches can support communities through projects that ease financial pressures and the isolation poverty brings. This includes a number of projects delivered with community partners in Durham and Canterbury dioceses:

- 'One for the Basket' helping food banks;
- Set up a Community Bank & Hub;
- Introduced a Community Wardrobe;
- Opened a Breakfast Club for vulnerable/homeless adults;
- Supported Places of Welcome, Warm
 Spaces and access to Free Debt Advice.

It is vital we support clergy well-being including their conditions of service. I support the upcoming motion to restore the clergy pension to the 2/3rd's level and also see the need for long-term thinking on sustainable clergy renumeration and housing - including retirement housing - as well as clear access to practical support for clergy and members of their family when they need it.

Everyone is Welcome

I believe in an inclusive church which does not discriminate and where there is a space for all at the table. I believe the Prayers of Love and Faith should be available for clergy to use where pastorally appropriate - on an opt-in basis - and also respect the right of clergy not to use the prayers as a matter of theological conscience.

We need to listen to one another and allow space for people to minister according to their calling and conscience, respecting differences and finding our unity in Christ. I also support the General Synod's work in developing a national strategy to support people from working class backgrounds through the process of discernment, training and ordination.
